RECTORY OFFICE HOURS

The rectory office hours are Monday through Friday from 9:00am to noon and 1:00pm to 5:00pm. During the summer the rectory will close at 3:00pm on Fridays. Items for the Sunday newsletter must be at the rectory by Monday at noon for publication the following Sunday.

BAPTISMS

Baptisms are held at 12 noon on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month. Parents must attend a Pre-Jordan class held in the Wright Center at 12 noon on the first Sunday of every other month (please refer to the bulletin for exact dates). Registration for the class is required. In order to arrange for a baptism, the parents must be active members of the parish for six months. To register, please call the rectory office at 610/789-7676. Godparents should be practicing Catholics, confirmed and at least 16 years of age. If not from this parish, sponsors must have a letter of eligibility from their parish stating that they have been actively participating for six months. St. Bernadette Parishioners must be registered and actively participating for six months to receive a letter of eligibility.

MARRIAGES

We request that couples contemplating marriage call the rectory to make an appointment with the priest. At this initial interview, the date and time of your request will be recorded and you will receive a copy of the Parish Wedding Guidelines.

SACRAMENT OF THE SICK/COMMUNION CALLS

A priest will administer Holy Communion to parishioners who are unable to come to Church. If you desire, Eucharistic Ministers can bring Communion each week. Please contact the Rectory to be placed on our Sick List. Parishioners who are to undergo serious surgery at a hospital are encouraged to make an appointment at the Rectory before going to the hospital.

FAST AND ABSTINENCE AND **OTHER ACTS OF PENANCE FOR LENT**

The Bishops of the United States prescribe, as minimal obligation, that all persons who are fourteen years of age and older are bound to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, February 14, on all the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday. Further, all persons eighteen years of age and older, up to and including their fifty-ninth birthday, are bound to fast by limiting themselves to a single full meal on Ash Wednesday and on Good Friday, while the other two meals on those days are to be light.

All the faithful are encouraged, when possible, to participate at Mass and to receive the Holy Eucharist daily, to celebrate frequently the Sacrament of Penance, to undertake spiritual reading, especially the study of the Sacred Scriptures, and to participate in parish Lenten devotions as well as Lenten education programs. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is especially recommended.

All are encouraged to participate in Operation Rice Bowl-the collection will be taken up on Palm Sunday, March 24.

THE PASTOR'S COLUMN

"I do will it. Be made clean."

In today's readings we hear about the sickness of leprosy and the pain, disfigurement, and alienation of those that suffer from the disease. Leprosy was a devastating prognosis with no treatment or cure. In the Gospel, Jesus does the impossible. He heals this incurable illness. He relieves the pain. He rectifies the disfigurement. He reconciles the alienated to the community.

One of the great lessons we learn from these reading is that, even though we are not be able to see it, sin causes the same effects on our souls as leprosy does to the body. Sin wounds our souls and leaves it disfigured from what God created it to be. Sin also damages our relationship with God and our community, making it more difficult to relate to one another. Jesus does not want us to be separated from himself and the community. He desires for us to be healed and he can heal us. Often times we either don't realize the extent of our woundedness or we are too ashamed to bring it to Him.

So these readings are a sign of Hope. We know from our previous week's readings that we are called by Jesus Christ to follow Him as disciples. It is comforting to know that he knows we are not perfect and we are effected by sin. However he does not simply leave us to wallow in the despair of that sin. He "wills that we be made clean." He is stronger than any sin we can commit and desires to restore us to health in mind, spirit, and soul. He gives us great comfort and hope.

This week we begin the Liturgical Season of Lent. It is a time of penance where we focus on the practices of Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving to prepare ourselves for the great celebration of Easter. We are called to intentionally discern how to best approach this season to grow in our faith and answer God's call in our lives. There are many weekly and one time events going on here at St. Bernadette's and the other parishes in the Drexel Hill and Delco area. Be sure to check the Bulletin, Website, Social Media and other forms of communication with all the events and activities going on here at Bernie's for Lent, Easter, and the Spring.



ST. BERNADETTE OF LOURDES - - - FEAST DAY - FEBRUARY 16

Saint Bernadette of Lourdes, also known as Marie-Bernarde Soubirous, was a French saint whose remarkable visions led to the establishment of the Marian shrine of Lourdes. Here are some key details about her life:

Birth: She was born on January 7, 1844, in Lourdes, France.

<u>Visions</u>: Between February 11 and July 16, 1858, when she was just 14 years old, Bernadette experienced a series of 18 visions of the Virgin Mary in the nearby Massabielle grotto. During these visions, Mary revealed her identity with the words: "I am the Immaculate Conception."

<u>Messages</u>: Mary conveyed various messages to Bernadette during these encounters, including the instruction to build a chapel at the grotto.

<u>Challenges</u>: Despite strong opposition from her parents, local clergy, and civil authorities, Bernadette steadfastly defended the authenticity of her visions.

Later Life: To escape public attention, she became a boarder at a local school run by the Sisters of Charity of Nevers. In 1866, she entered the novitiate in the motherhouse at Nevers.

Holiness and Suffering: Despite constant sickness and pain, Bernadette remained kind, holy, and witty. She willingly accepted her sufferings as penance, fulfilling her "Lady's" request.

<u>Canonization</u>: Pope Pius XI canonized her in 1933, authenticating her visions and the veneration of Mary as Our Lady of Lourdes.

Today, Lourdes remains a major pilgrimage center for those seeking healing, and the story of Saint Bernadette continues to inspire millions of visitors who come to this sacred site.
